SFCP Board Chair Report

At this time of the year, the major work before the SFCP Board of Trustees is the approval of the next year's organizational budget. We are very fortunate to have an excellent Administrative Director and Office Manager, Marcia Hodges and Nicole Lee respectively, on our staff. They spend many hours working with the various divisions of the organization and together to develop a balanced budget to bring to the Board. Our new Board Treasurer, Rui Bao, is also involved in the process. The Board then hears a presentation about the draft budget, asks questions, makes suggestions, and ultimately votes to approve the budget. The Board will be voting on the 2024-25 budget at the June Board meeting.

Key points from the May Board meeting:

- The Bureau for Private Postsecondary Education (BPPE) application was submitted.
- The new Employee Handbook was approved.
- Rui Bao led an engaging and interactive process about how Trustees interface with SFCP's finances and budgeting. She will use the learning to inform financial reports and discussions with the Board.
- The Facilities Committee recruited an ad hoc subcommittee to review artwork on display in the building.
- The Facilities Committee informed the Board of a leak in the building roof. Bids for repair were discussed.

As a reminder, the Board of Trustee's Annual Meeting, typically held in June, will be held on September 21st this year and will be followed by a reception to welcome members to the 2024-25 academic year. You will receive announcements by email. We hope to see you there.

DIVERSITY EQUITY INCLUSION (DEI) STEERING COMMITTEE

Diversity Equity Inclusion (DEI) Steering Committee Update

For the academic year 2023-2024 the DEI Steering Committee included Lovina Chahal, Karim Dajani, Chuck Fisher, Debora Fletcher, Marcia Hodges, Clara Kwun, Jennie Merovick, and Beth Steinberg.

Several ongoing projects include:

- Working to help SFCP develop and administer curricula that include voices that have been typically marginalized and that accurately present the history of the social within psychoanalysis.
- A Curricula Subcommittee is learning from and thinking with various SFCP programs and faculty to socialize this goal and to support faculty in locating and integrating appropriate readings and in teaching this material.
- Analyzing DEI-related incidents as the Committee becomes aware of them and is asking questions of and making recommendations to the SFCP leadership.
- Developing a DEI resources page for the SFCP website.
- Through a number of its members, actively participating in the process that SFCP is using to revise its mission statement. The Steering Committee seeks to ensure a commitment to DEI is included in the revised mission, or closely linked to it.
- Working with the Strategic Directions subcommittee on DEI and Group Experience to develop a support tool for learning and reconciliation when a racial injury has occurred.

A significant part of our DEI Consultant, David Luna's work continues to be consulting to various SFCP leaders and entities on emerging and urgent issues, and on a variety of issues that are less immediate. There is an intention to offer a weekend, in-person training next fall.

We want to share our gratitude for the work done by Lovina and Karim. They each served longer than the initial 6 month term and have decided not to continue working on the committee. The committee is in a process of reflection about how hard this work is on BIPOC members of our community. We are looking at ways to shift our culture of how we work together and inviting additional BIPOC voices to the process for the next year.

Report from the Co-Chairs of the Palo Alto Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy Training Program

PAPPTP is pleased to announce our graduate this year, Elizabeth (Libby) Wood. Libby has a practice seeing adolescents and adults in Santa Cruz. Congratulations Libby!

Neil Brast, MD gave our graduation speech with a thought-provoking talk about, "The Right Stuff." He considered the traits and qualities to be continually developed as a treating psychodynamic/psychoanalytic psychotherapist. Thank you Neil!

Teams versus Committees

"Would you rather join a team or serve on a committee?" I asked this of a group of PAPPTP students without defining "team" or "committee," They all said, "Join a team." I asked why. They said, "A team is more fun." So, as a team, we are planning a study group on social and cultural issues in psychotherapy with particular attention to safety in the group.

For a year I have had the privilege and pleasure of being on a team with Meryl Botkin, Susan Hamlin, and Mary McMillan. We are the Strategic Direction Team #1, an offshoot of the 2022 Strategic Planning process. We meet monthly on Saturday mornings for two hours. We rotate the roles of leader and notetaker. We check in with each other at the beginning and ask how the meeting went at the end. We share agenda-making and plan the next meeting. The interactions are lively, creative, and heartfelt. At the end, we feel energized and appreciative of the warm collegiality. Responsibility is shared. Everyone has tasks to do before the next meeting. We learn from each other. We're glad to have spent the time together.

The Palo Alto Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy Training Program (PAPPTP), like too many programs at SFCP, is facing a crisis of demographics. Our committee chairs have been in place five to ten years, are in their seventies, and are wanting to pull back from their roles -- without having recruited anyone to take their places. This poses an existential threat to PAPPTP. Without adequate volunteer staffing, we may have to mothball some or all the educational opportunities we offer -- until such time as a groundswell of volunteers resuscitates PAPPTP.(As we saw with the Scientific Meetings.)

The three PAPPTP Co-chairs (Catherine Phillips, Tina St. Lorant, and Neil Brast) want to try something new: We are recommending that PAPPTP transition from a committee-based organization to a teambased structure. In a committee-based organization, responsibility resides with the committee chair, who is at risk of becoming the sole person doing the work, burning out or passing out, and not transmitting their accumulated knowledge, skills, and wisdom to others, preferably younger. In a teambased structure, the responsibility for the team accomplishing its tasks would be shared among the team members. That would afford newer volunteers the opportunity to gain experience as apprentices to the more experienced team members and gradually take on greater responsibility. And PAPPTP would be enlivened by the creativity and innovative ideas of the younger members.

Let's see how this experiment unfolds.

SFCP Community Members - Mentoring Program!

Would you like to meet with an analyst to discuss your questions about psychoanalytic thinking and clinical work? We'd love to meet with you! The Mentoring Program at SFCP matches participants with analyst mentors to discuss the mentee's interest in psychoanalytic work.

The Mentoring Program is open to mental health clinicians at all levels of training and experience, who are SFCP Community Members, an easy and fun community to join! Mentors meet once a month with mentees for the academic year.

Examples of Topics to Discuss:

- Information, resources and literature to help a mentee explore particular areas of interest. For example: work with particular populations such as trauma survivors; current thinking about LGBTQ issues; the impact of race, class and culture on psychological life; child work; mindfulness; research about psychoanalytic process; and psychoanalytic interfaces with other fields such as poetry, literature, neurosciences
- How to choose among current activities, programs, courses, and services offered by SFCP that are relevant to the mentee's interests and stage of training
- Questions about developing as a psychoanalytic psychotherapist and about psychoanalytic training
- Connecting the mentee with colleagues who the mentor thinks might be a valuable resource based on the mentee's interest in a particular subject

"I'm new to private practice and was looking to get mentoring and support from someone with a deep knowledge of psychotherapy. During our initial meetings I was able to get several very practical and pressing questions answered and feel more confident about seeing clients in my new private practice setting. We discussed psychoanalytic approaches to working with parents and children, which helped me to move forward with my cases and also to consider aspects that I had not previously considered. I have a particular interest in mindfulness and my mentor put me in touch with a therapist who incorporates mindfulness into a psychodynamic therapy practice. In addition, I work with children and my mentor referred me to the Child Colloquium, where I met other clinicians and heard a very helpful presentation. I feel very fortunate to meet with my mentor as needs arise."





REBECCA SHAPIRO, MA






