President's Report

Many thanks to those of you who participated in the 2024 Demographic survey which was included as a link in all 2024 membership registration, membership renewal, and program enrollment forms.

The 2024 SFCP Demographic Survey was conducted by Management Team with the following aims:

- To obtain data regarding how SFCP members self-identify, which offers a macro-level perspective on who is in our organization and who is not.
- To encourage **awareness** regarding how we each identify; **reflection** on how this impacts our experience within SFCP; and **curiosity** about the experience of others who identify differently.
- To **develop more accurate forecasting** regarding the financial and organizational impact of projected member retirements.
- To facilitate tracking of demographics over time, and assess the impact of our efforts toward building an SFCP community culture that embraces diversity and meets the needs of current mental health clinicians.

This report raises a number of important questions for our membership (some of which were asked directly by survey respondents): Why are we doing a demographic survey? What are the implications of this data for our present organization? For the future of SFCP? How do we – as a community – make meaning of this report?

COG Corner

Dear Community,

As the new academic year begins, the Committee on Groups (COG) reaffirms its mission to raise awareness of group dynamics at SFCP. To this end, COG Corner aims to introduce and briefly discuss an aspect of group life each month.

As we navigate various groups at SFCP—whether in seminars, committees, or continuing education events—it is essential to recognize the underlying principles that shape our collective interactions. This month, we are exploring the concept of "valencies," a term inspired by the work of Wilfred Bion. Borrowed from chemistry, where it refers to the readiness of an atom to combine with other atoms, valency in this context refers to an individual's spontaneous, unconscious tendency to enter into combination with a group in making and acting on basic assumptions. Each person may assume specific roles based on their particular valency, which can also influence how they express emotions within the group.

For example, an individual with a strong dependency valency tends to form dependent relationships within the group. They may be more inclined to seek guidance and protection from a leader or authority figure, consistently looking to the leader for direction while avoiding initiative or independent decision-making. In contrast, a person with a strong fight-or-flight valency might exhibit aggressive or evasive behaviors when perceiving a threat or challenge within the group. They may mobilize the group's aggressive tendencies or lead efforts to avoid tasks and responsibilities.

By observing our participation in groups, we can gradually become aware of our individual valencies, allowing us to make more intentional choices about how we engage. The next time you're in a group, take a moment to reflect on your valency and consider alternative approaches. You may be surprised by how this affects both your personal experience and the overall functioning of the group.

Would you like to meet with an analyst to discuss your questions about psychoanalytic thinking and clinical work? We'd love to meet with you! The Mentoring Program at SFCP matches participants with analyst mentors to discuss the mentee's interest in psychoanalytic work.

The Mentoring Program is open to mental health clinicians at all levels of training and experience, who are SFCP Community Members, an easy and fun community to join! Mentors meet once a month with mentees for the academic year.

Examples of Topics to Discuss:

- Information, resources and literature to help a mentee explore particular areas of interest. For example: work with particular populations such as trauma survivors; current thinking about LGBTQ issues; the impact of race, class and culture on psychological life; child work; mindfulness; research about psychoanalytic process; and psychoanalytic interfaces with other fields such as poetry, literature, neurosciences
- How to choose among current activities, programs, courses, and services offered by SFCP that are relevant to the mentee's interests and stage of training
- Questions about developing as a psychoanalytic psychotherapist and about psychoanalytic training
- Connecting the mentee with colleagues who the mentor thinks might be a valuable resource based on the mentee's interest in a particular subject



SCIENTIFIC MEETING

BORN SMALL, ADDICTED TO GUILT:

Psychoanalysis-informed treatment of self-identified addicts with special attention to underlying shame and guilt

Psychoanalysis has generally had a marginalized role in the treatment of addictions, however a psychoanalytically informed understanding of psychological defense mechanisms that drive addicts to loose control and sobriety can be very helpful in treatment. In this presentation, Graeme Daniels, with years of experience in the field of addiction treatment, will emphasize the sense of impotence the addict feels, impotence often derived from childhood maltreatment. Oppressive helplessness drives the addict to find an escape, which often leads to substance use and/or grandiose defense mechanisms. When grandiosity fails, further substance use occurs, which in turn causes oppressive guilt and a need for further escape. The presentation will illustrate with clinical examples how non-short-term, open-minded and in-depth treatment can help a struggling addict understand their internal emotional dynamics as they emerge in a treatment that allows for the unfolding of a transference.

Graeme Daniels, MFT is the lead author of the book Getting Real About Sex Addiction. He teaches at SFCP, is a post-seminar candidate at SFCP, has over 25 years of experience in the field of addiction, and practices in Walnut Creek, CA.

Susan Hamlin, LCSW, Psychoanalyst, Member SFCP, will be giving Prefatory Remarks on Addiction and Psychoanalysis.

Enactment: Its Provocation by the Analyst

This presentation will outline how the analyst can unobtrusively create the space within which the fullness of the patient's unsymbolized internal world and trauma can be realized and companioned. Rather than bringing the patient into the analyst's reality and understanding, healing arises from being known in the register of illusion, fragmentation and non-relatedness that are the signature of the residue of trauma and neglect.

ROBERT GROSSMARK, **PH.D**, **ABPP** is a psychoanalyst in New York City. He works with individuals, groups and couples and conducts psychoanalytic consultation and study groups.

He is on the teaching and supervising faculty at the New York University Postdoctoral Program in Psychotherapy and Psychoanalysis, The National Institute for the Psychotherapies Program in Adult Psychoanalysis, The National Training Program in Psychoanalysis, National Faculty Member, the Florida Psychoanalytic Center and lectures at other psychoanalytic institutes and clinical psychology training programs nationally and internationally. He is an Associate Editor for *Psychoanalytic Dialogues*.

He is the author of *The Unobtrusive Relational Analyst: Explorations in Psychoanalytic Companioning* and co-edited *The One and the Many: Relational Approaches to Group Psychotherapy and Heterosexual Masculinities: Contemporary Perspectives from Psychoanalytic Gender Theory*, all published by Routledge.

Substance Abuse in an Adolescent Boy – Waking the Object

This presentation by **Dr. Mary Brady**, expands psychoanalytic understanding and treatment when substance abuse is a central symptom in an adolescent. Her analysis of an adolescent boy abusing alcohol, marijuana, and other drugs is used to discuss unconscious object relationships that can underlie substance dependence. She will address the challenge of differentiating experimental from dangerous substance use. The boy's escalating substance use is viewed both as an effort to numb himself and to "speak" through symptoms of problems he could not yet name. Rosenfeld's (1960/1966) view of the relationship of drug addiction to an identification with an ill or dead object is used to explicate the boy's psychodynamics. Aspects of containment by the analyst that contribute in different ways to an adolescent's capacity to think about their self-destructiveness will be discussed along with the need for confrontation and ancillary care when substance abuse becomes life threatening.

Dr. Brady is an adult and child psychoanalyst practicing in San Francisco. On the Faculties of the San Francisco Center for Psychoanalysis and the Psychoanalytic Institute of Northern California, she received the American Psychoanalytic Association's Roughton Award for her writing which includes, Analytic Engagements with Adolescents, and The Body in Adolescence (Routledge 2018 and 2016). She is Editor of Braving the Erotic Field in the Treatment of Children and Adolescents, (Routledge, 2022). Her forthcoming book is titled, Psychoanalysis with Adolescents and Children: Learning to Surf (Routledge.) Dr. Brady is also the IPA North American Co-Chair for the Committee on Child and Adolescent Psychoanalysis (COCAP) and for a decade has co-led a Psychoanalysis and Film group.

Lester Isenstadt M.D. 09/29/2024

Lester Isenstadt M.D., born to Abraham and Charlotte Isenstadt, passed away on September 29, 2024, aged 82. He was surrounded by his family, to whom he was devoted. He is survived by his wife of 42 years, Catherine, and his sons Alex and Joseph.

Lester grew up in Cambridge, MA. He suffered illness as a child, and determined to become a doctor in order to provide the same deep care and dedication that he received from his own doctors.

He attended Boston University and then enrolled at the University of Arkansas Medical School to train to be a psychiatrist. He told colorful stories of the culture shock of being one of the few Jewish people in Little Rock. After medical school he moved to San Francisco for his psychiatric residency, and when that was completed trained as a child and adult psychoanalyst. He found deep purpose in his work and in helping his patients.

He became passionate about neuroscience as the field of psychology became increasingly informed by it. He loved to spend his time studying neurobiological literature to better help his patients. He was particularly interested in how people react to mistakes and showing his patients that mistakes are a gift and a gateway to learning. He was devoted to learning, and used to say that a day was wasted if he hadn't learned something. Even in his final weeks, he continued to study and remained devoted to his patients and their emotional wellbeing.
